Art Conservation at the Museum

At Mission San Luis Rey, we have one of the largest collections of artifacts, historical objects, and art of any mission in California. Some pieces date back to the 1500's with artwork that decorated, not just our Historic Church, but churches in Los Angeles and the San Diego Mission. With thousands of objects in our collection, conservation can be an expensive and difficult challenge. We'd like to share some of those efforts with you.

In the summer of 2021, after reopening the Historic Church to the public, we noticed some damage to the image of our Lady of Guadalupe in the Madonna Chapel. This painting was painted in 1924 by Federico Rivera, with a note in Spanish pointing out that it was done according to the original, in the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City. The damage to the painting was from a drink that was thrown on the painting by a visitor to the Historic Church. When staff noticed what happened, we called a team of conservators from Balboa Art Conservation Center (BACC) who took the painting along with two others from our collection, to their studio. After cleaning the superficial grime, and studying it carefully for a year, they determined that the image could not be restored. Despite this, we will hang it in its usual spot inside the Madonna Chapel, and explain what happened, in hopes of making people aware of the difficult and challenging task that conservation can be.

The second Madonna painting, an image of our *Lady* of *Refuge*, also from the Madonna Chapel, had a better fate. This large painting of unknown origin, has basic figures and shapes that might indicate it was painted by an inexperienced painter, possibly of native Mexican origin. Cleaning the superficial grime, highlighted the original colors of the image, which were hiding for decades behind a layer of old, rusted varnish and candle smoke. The painting will be hung back in the Madonna Chapel in its usual spot, on the left side of the small altar, at the end of August 2022.

The third Madonna is a success story when it comes to conservation efforts at Mission San Luis Rey. Found also in the summer of 2021, hiding in a corner inside a storage room, it caught my eye right away. It is a beautiful copy done in the 1800s of a baroque masterpiece, The Madonna of the Veil, by Carlo Dolci. Registered in the collection inventories at San Luis Rey since the 1940s, and always in storage, the canvas was ripped, the oil was cracking, and there was some overpaint and several layers of dark varnish. The team of painting conservationists at BACC was able to stabilize it, clean it and highlight the sweetness of the image. They brought it back to life. It will be on display at the end of August in the Mission San Luis Rey Museum, where everyone who walks by will be able to appreciate its beauty.

Ecology Corner

Here are three great ideas to repurpose some of that clutter around your house. Rather than throwing these items in trash, consider these alternatives. Martha Stewart would be so proud of your crafting prowess.

Shirt Produce Bag

You've seen those great produce bags that are a wonderful alternative to plastic bags? Your old t-shirts may be a solution to your quandary. These simple produce bags can be made with any t-shirt! With a few cuts and optional sewing, you can make a pile

of colorful storage bags to keep your produce fresh and organized. Simply cut off the sleeves of your old t-shirt, cut rows of one-inch slits, about two inches apart, three quarters of the way down your shirt. Now, you can either sew the bottom of your t-shirt, or cut fringe across the bottom and tie them to close off your produce bag.

Old Tea Set Bird Feeders

Lastly, one the kids can help with! This simple bird feeder is a great activity for your kids to do. Plus, your kids can learn about native birds in your area during the process! Just use a super adhesive glue to affix an old teacup to the saucer and hang wherever and however you like. I prefer twine for a more natural look. You can hang them directly onto a tree branch or here is fancier look.

Repurposed Candle Jars

We all have a few burnt-out candles lying around, but they're too beautiful to throw out — right? Instead, you can repurpose them into jars, pen holders, makeup brush holders, cotton ball holders, or anything else you can think of. Give it a try! You may be saying to yourself – how do I get the wax out of the bottom of that beautiful candle jar. Simply put the jar in your freezer for an hour or so, then carefully use a butter knife or spoon to pop out the remaining layer of wax.
